3. CCI World Championship Trophy of studbooks for young horses

Medals provided by WBFSH

A ranking will be established between stud books members of the WBFSH. The winning stud book member is one with the lowest total of penalty points, after adding together the final score of the 3 highest placed competitors (6 yearold result have a coefficient of 0,8 and 7 year-old result have a coefficient of 1). All horses entered to the Championship for young horses are automatically entered to participate to the Championship Trophy of stud books. The entry form must be completed entirely. All information concerning the stud book must be informed. The native stud book member will check the information given on the entry form to take part to the World Championship Trophy of stud books WBFSH.

The entry form must be filled in entirely. It corresponds to the standard norms of the FEI entry, as well as the information requested by the OC for the participation to the World Championship Trophy of breeds WBFSH.

The entry form must be filled in online (<u>www.mondialdulion.com</u>, on Internet) to register the nominative entries of the rider and horse for the participation to the World Championship for Young Eventing horses of 6 and 7.

The OC gives the information to the stud-book for validation.



The stud-book must send the entry back to the OC before the first vet inspection, to be entitled to take part to the Championship Trophy of stud books WBFSH.



V. PARTICIPATION / INVITATIONS (Art. 107, 108, 120, 507)

VI. REGISTRATION OF ATHLETES & HORSES

All Athletes & horses participating in any International Eventing competition must be registered with the FEI. (Art. 511.1 and 511.2)

1. QUALIFICATIONS

Each NF must certify the qualification of each horse and athlete and list the competitions which enabled horse and athlete to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level. Please include the relevant procedure according to level of event in schedule (refer to Part B attached and Rules for Eventing Art. 506).

1.1. Principles

In order to compete at an international event, a athlete and horse must have obtained a Qualifying Result (QR) at a number of events at a lower level.

The requirements are laid out below. With the approval of the FEI and their own NF, OCs may impose additional qualifications for horses and/or athletes, which must be published in the schedule.



1.2. Qualifying Result (QR)

A Qualifying Result (QR) is achieved by completing a competition within minimum parameters of all round performance. As follows:

- Dressage Test: not more than 75 penalty points;
- Cross-Country Test:

- From 2009 onwards, the results at obstacles at International events need to include, where applicable, a clear round (0 penalties) at obstacles for CICs events and maximum 20 penalties at a CCI.

- Not more than 90 seconds exceeding the optimum time in the Cross. At 4* events, the maximum time by which the optimum time may be exceeded is 120 seconds; and

- Jumping Test: not more than 16 penalties at obstacles.

1.3. Certification of Qualification for Events

1.3.1. All NFs, including the host nation, are responsible to certify that athletes and horses entered by them in international events are correctly qualified in accordance with all the requirements of the Rules.

1.3.2. All qualifying events must be identified, and any national events must be certified as of at least the equivalent standard of difficulty as the relevant international star level of competition.

1.3.3. The Technical Delegate or his nominee shall check that all horses and athletes starting at all International events are properly certified as qualified by their NF or duly exempted in accordance with this article.

1.4. Qualifying Period and Deadline

1.4.1 QRs for CIOs, CCIs and CICs must be obtained in the calendar year in question or the 2 preceding calendar years.

1.4.2 A QR at a CCI must be obtained at least 24 days before the Cross Country test of the event for which it is needed; a QR at a CIC must be obtained at least 10 days before the event for which it is needed.

1.4.3 Qualifications may be achieved as a combination.

1.4.4 Where a QR at a CIC is specified, one QR at a CCI of the same level is equally acceptable.

1. ATHLETES

Riders are responsible for their own accommodation and meals.

A list of the nearest accommodation is available at Le Lion d'Angers tourism office that will assist in making reservations on request: otintercomleliondangers@wanadoo.fr.

The riders are invited to a welcoming cocktail on Wednesday evening as well as a gala reception on Saturday evening.

2. GROOMS

Riders are responsible to arrange the accommodation and meals for their groom. OCs must provide sufficient sanitary and showering facilities, with hot and cold water for male and female grooms.

3. HORSES / PONIES

Horses of all riders will be stabled free of charge on the competition grounds from 12th to 16th October 2009.

Hay and straw: will be provided free of charge (5 kg of hay and 5 kg of straw per horse per day).

Any other kind of bedding (shavings...) will be provided on written request when the definite entries are made and a fee of 60€ paid to the OC (4 Bales to begin with and 1 bale if necessary afterwards).

A number of horse boxes are available for use as tack rooms.

If stabling is required for a horse that is not competing at the Mondial du Lion but entered at Pau Eventing, riders can fill in a special stable reservation form, available on www.mondialdulion.com.

4. WELCOME

First day for arrival: Monday 12th October 2009.

5. OWNERS

The owners whose name is on the definite entries (max: 2 owners per horse) will receive:

- One free admission on the grounds,
- One invitation to the welcoming cocktail on Wednesday evening,
- One invitation to the cocktail party on Saturday evening.



VII. VETERINARY ASPECTS (Art. 1004.2, 1005, 1011, 1021.1 & 518)

7.1 <u>VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT</u> <u>CONTROLS</u> These will be carried out in accordance with the "Veterinary Regulations", Art. 1011 & "Rules for Eventing" **Art. 518.1 for CCIs and 518.2** for CICs.

Art. 511.2.2

Every horse entered for any competition at CCNs, CICs 2/1* or CCIs 2/1* in a foreign country (GRs Art. 141.2), and all horses entered for CICs 3*, CCIs 4/3*, CCIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI and accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card and, when applicable, an FEI registration number, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 511.2.3

Horses taking part in CCNs, CICs 2/1* or CCIs 2/1* in the country in which they are resident are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned Paragraph 2.2. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable and unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin, all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

7.2 <u>EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, VET. REGS. ANNEX VII</u> (except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given **between 1 and 3 months apart**. In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding **6** months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must have been given within the preceding 7 days including the day of the competition or of entry into the competition stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer's instructions which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling.

7.3 <u>SAMPLING PROCEDURE FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES</u> (Vet. Regs, Ch. V & VI and Annex IV)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCIs 4/3*, CCIOs, World Cup[™] Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CCIs sampling is recommended. When testing takes place, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Vet. Regs. Art. 1016).

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

The Organising Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.



7.4 GROUPS I & II ONLY - MCP CENTRAL LABORATORY

Under the Medication Control Programme (MCP) in **Groups I and II**, all samples collected in accordance with Vet. Regs. Art. 1016 will be analysed by the **Laboratoire des Courses Hippiques**, **Verrières-Ie-Buisson**, **France**. The central MCP laboratory will be reviewed in June 2005. Please refer to FEI Bulletin for further information. For events <u>other than</u> those listed in Vet. Regs. Art. 1016 or for events <u>other than</u> in Groups I and II, samples may be analysed at an alternative FEI listed laboratory (Vet. Regs. Art. 1021).

7.5 CUSTOM FORMALITIES

Any horse arriving on French territory from country outside the E.E.C. should be in possession of a Temporary Import Permit delivered by I'U.N.I.C., (9, rue Rougemont 75009 Paris - Phone. 00.33.1.53.34.17.50 - Fax: 00.33.1.48.24.42.40).

On entering French territory the horses are covered by temporary admission certificates and exempt from any payment of a deposit providing the temporary import documents and the above certificates are in order. Competitors are urgently requested to have the A.T.A documents delivered to them.

As customs formalities are taken care of by the organizing committee, transit and customs documents should be filled in directly on the show-ground at the following address:

NFs holding an international event in their country should inform their National Veterinary Authority and their Customs Authority at least four weeks beforehand. They should request every facility to assist the movement of horses accompanied by FEI Passports, and the necessary veterinary certification at frontier crossing points into and out of their countries. (Vet. Regs. Art. 1004.2)

7.6 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES

Details on compulsory health tests and, where applicable, quarantine, etc.

Please annex specimen import licences (for Laboratory Health Tests), which will be applied to horses attending this event. In case of doubts or problems, please contact the FEI Veterinary Department as soon as possible.

7.7 APPROVED LABORATORY

Details of FEI Approved Laboratory appointed to carry out analyses on samples collected at this event ("Veterinary Regulations", Art. 1021 & FEI Bulletin).

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

8.1 OBJECTIONS/COMPLAINTS (Art. 166)

All complaints to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150 or equivalent.

8.2 DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY

Full details of any deductions from prize money must be outlined in the schedule. This includes government taxes. If it is necessary for OCs to deduct such taxes, they must provide participants with an official form indicating the amount of tax deducted.

8.3 EVENTING MEDICAL CARD (Annex 7 "Rules for Eventing")

OCs must draw the attention of all competitors that they must carry readily accessible on themselves a medical card for the Cross-Country Test. Armbands must be checked by the OC upon arrival to the competition by the athletes and checked by the Official Doctor and the Technical Delegate for accurate information.

8.4 INSURANCES

Details pertaining to insurance of competitors, horses, etc

Responsibility of OC for damages, fire, theft, etc

The following is to be published in verbatim in all schedules:

"All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out a third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad and to keep the policy up to date".

8.5 EVENT'S ORGANISATION (Art. 114 & 115)

The OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. All modifications made to the schedule must have the approval of the FEI Secretary General.



8.6 ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS

OC to include details concerning right of entry to show-grounds of owners, grooms, athletes, other persons.

8.7 STABLE

Security and stewarding at International events, see Annex II of this Check List.

8.8 RESULTS

In order to proceed with the results publication for qualification purposes, the FEI requires results to be sent in immediately after the conclusion of the event. Please refer to compulsory format for CCIs and CICs. Results to be sent by e-mail to **fabienne.diserens@fei.org**, preferably on Excel file immediately after the event. All results must include FEI Passport Registration number of horses. **All athletes who have not completed the event must appear on the results sheets.** Exact distance of the Cross-country course must be included on result sheet.

IX. STABLE SECURITY/STEWARDING AT INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

Minimum requirements to ensure implementation of Veterinary Regulations, Art.1005.2

9.1 ACCESS TO STABLE AREA

For an optimal stable security, the stables must be completely enclosed within a suitably restrictive perimeter (stable area) which will act both as a deterrent to the admission of unauthorised persons and to the exit of horses. The area must be sufficiently large to allow horses to be evacuated from the stables in an emergency but still remain within the confines of the perimeter. However, several disciplines allow in specific situations a lower level of stable security (see discipline rules).

Whenever possible the stable area must include only stables; lorries, caravans, etc., should not be permitted within the area unless specifically needed as accommodation for horses and/or grooms.

Access to stables must be limited to those persons indicated in VRs Art. 1005.2.5.2. It is essential that the official issuing authorised access be a responsible person of seniority within the OC.



9.2 CONTROL OF ACCESS

A control system must operate at all entrance gates so that there is an efficient and reliable method of identifying those who enter and leave the stable area at any time.

Extra vigilance must be used in establishing the identity of persons and reasons for entering the stables during the night.

9.3 STEWARDING OF STABLE AREA

At least one stable steward, directly responsible to the Chief Steward, must be present or readily available in the vicinity of the stable area 24 hours a day during the entire duration of the event. He may be assisted by deputies as required. The steward/deputies must regularly patrol the stable area, without establishing any predetermined pattern, to discourage any form of illegal practices or abuses to horses. Any misdemeanours must be reported immediately to the stable steward who must, in turn, report to the Chief Steward.

The duty of the stewards is therefore to safeguard the welfare of the horses and to prevent any form of illegal practices.

9.4 GROOMS

It is appreciated that grooms wish to remain with their horses during the night. Only grooms duly registered with the OC are permitted to do so.

The Person Responsible must ensure that his/her grooms, or any other authorised persons with access to his/her horses, are familiar with the security and stewarding procedures operating at the event attended.

9.5 MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT EVENT GROUNDS

Movement of horses between the stables, practice, grazing and main arena must be strictly controlled. The optimum layout for Jumping and Dressage disciplines is attached. It is appreciated that flexibility will be required depending on the requirements of other disciplines.

9.6 STEWARDING OF PRACTICE ARENA

The Chief Steward must ensure that all practice arenas are adequately stewarded all the time that they are officially open. He must also ensure that these arenas are subject to random control when they are officially closed.



9.7 GRAZING AREA

It is recommended that a grazing area be provided at all outdoor events, and that this be subject to random control. If available, horses must only be grazed or walked in hand within this area.

The Foreign Judge/TD at events will be specifically asked to check that the relevant requirements are met as reasonably as can be expected, depending on the discipline, and to indicate clearly any shortfalls, following which consideration may be given to altering the category of the event in future.

X. WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The following is to be published in verbatim in all schedules:

The following Code of Conduct was elaborated by the FEI for all people involved in the welfare of competing horses. The purpose is to ensure the health and welfare of horses participating under FEI Rules and Regulations and protecting the good image of the equestrian sport. To achieve the widest possible publicity it must be included in the **Schedules** and it is recommended that it also be included in the **Programmes** of all major international events.

CODE OF CONDUCT

FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.
